This memo is in response to your request for a Material Safety Data Sheet (MSDS) on chipboard which we supply to you. It is our understanding that chipboard is exempt from the requirements of the OSHA Right-to-Know (RTK) standard. OSHA considers recycled paperboard (chipboard) to be a wood product and has specifically exempted "wood or wood products" from the labeling and MSDS requirements of the standard (29 CFR 1910.1200 (b) (6)). I have attached a letter from Franklin Boxboard addressing this issue.

Dear Mr. Bliss:

The OSHA Hazard Communication Standard, cited above, requires that manufacturers and distributors of chemicals containing hazardous components provide MSDS forms and container labeling to their customers in the manufacturing SIC codes for products sold after November 25, 1985.

Franklin Boxboard has carefully investigated the applicability of the OSHA Standard to recycled paperboard which we produce. OSHA is currently considering whether paper products in general would qualify for exemption under Wood and Wood Products, but has not issued a definitive interpretation as yet on the matter. Those requirements would apply to certain specialty papers which contain hazardous components in excess of 1% by weight of the paper (or 0.1% for known carcinogens), requiring the preparation of MSDS forms and roll labels.

However, none of the plain chip produced for Shamrock by Franklin Boxboard contain any hazardous components in excess of the limits set forth in the Standard. Thus, there are no provisions of the OSHA Standard which apply to these paperboard products. Hazardous Communication information will be updated in the future for new developments in the OSHA Standard.
